An iron model of a fouled anchor, from the crest of the Burton family. It is dated from the first half of the 19th Century and was donated to the Museum by the great-granddaughter of James Burton, who built the original town of St Leonards between 1827 and 1837.



This is a pottery kylix, also known as a Minoan stem cup or drinking cup. It is from Crete in origin and dates back to 1300BC. It is decorated with what is believed to be a cuttlefish inspired design, but of course you can't see that in the silhouette! The kylix entered the Museum's collection in 1962, donated by the Went Tree Trust.
